International Fellowships provide stipends of \$16,500. To women of outstanding academic ability who are not citizens or permanent residents of the U.S., preference given to women whose credentials prove prior commitment to the advancement of women and girls through civic community or professional work. **Deadline December**

American Fellowships support women doctoral candidates completing dissertations, scholars seeking funds for postdoctoral research leave or for preparing completed research for publication. One-year postdoctoral research leave fellowships dissertation fellowships, and summer/short term research publication grants are offered.

Career Development Grants support women currently holding a bachelor's degree who are preparing to advance their careers, change careers, or re-enter the work force.

Community Action Grants provide seed money to individual women and AAUW branches and AAUW state organizations for innovative programs or non-degree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls.

Eleanor Roosevelt Teacher Fellowships are available to women K-12 public school teachers as individuals or as lead members of teams who develop innovative curriculum projects designed to encourage girls' interest and achievement in math, science, and/or technology.

Selected Professions Fellowships are awarded to women who are U.S. citizens or permanent residents and who intend to pursue a full-time course of study during the fellowship year in designated degree programs where women's participation traditionally has been low.

All of the ACLS fellowships are due by October 1st and the tenure is 6-12 months. ACLS invites research applicants in all disciplines of the humanities and the humanities-related social sciences. These fellowships are intended as a salary replacement to help scholars devote 6-12 continuous months to full-time research and writing.

Frederick Burkhardt Residential Fellowships for Recently Tenured Scholars provide up to \$65,000 for recently tenured scholars engaged in long term, unusually ambitious projects in the humanities and social sciences. The ACLS will award approximately 9 Burkhardt Fellowships per year in this and the next two years. **Deadline October F**

Fredrick Burkhardt Fellowships

Sponsored by American Council of Learned Societies, this fellowship supports more adventurous and longer- term patterns of research than are current in the humanities and related social sciences. An applicant must have begun his or her tenured contract at a U.S. institution no earlier than fall of 1999 semester. **F**

ACLS International and Area Studies Fellowships award up to \$25,000 for junior fellowships (Assistant Professor and career equivalent) and up to \$40,000 for senior fellowships (Associate and Full Professor and career equivalent), supporting postdoctoral research in all disciplines of the humanities or human related social sciences. These fellowships are intended as salary replacement to help scholars devote from six to twelve continuous months to full-time research and writing. **Deadline October F**

ACLS Andrew W. Mellon Fellowships for Junior Faculty provide 22 fellowships to Assistant Professors or the equivalent who will have at least two years' post Ph.D teaching experience by July 1st, 2004.

ACLS and New York public library fellowships offer a collaborative program to provide up to five residential fellowships at the library's Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Cent for Scholars and Writers. Also provides up to 15 fellows to explore the rich and divers collections of the NYPL Humanities and Social Services Library.

Charles A. Ryskamp Research Fellowships: These fellowships support advanced assistant and untenured associate professors in the humanities and related social sciences whose scholarly contributions have advanced their fields and who have well designed and carefully developed plans for new research. Fulbright Student Programs: The Fulbright program is funded by the US Congress and is offered to recent graduates of an accredited university, Master's students, and those working on their doctorates. It awards approximately 900 grants annually and currently operates in over 140 countries worldwide. There are many different programs offered through this foundation and all fall into one of the following categories.

Fulbright full grants: These grants generally provide roundtrip transportation; language or orientation courses. Where appropriate, tuition, in some cases; book and research allowances; maintenance for the academic year, based on living cost in the host country; and supplemental health and accident insurance.

Fulbright Travel Grants: Travel grants are available only to Germany, Hungary, or Italy. They are available to supplement an award from an outside source that does not provide funds for travel or to supplement a student's own funds for study. Travel grants provide, round-trip transportation to the country where the student will pursue studies for an academic year, supplemental health and accident insurance and the cost of an orientation course abroad, if applicable.

Foreign and Private Grants: These are specific benefits and special requirements of grants offered by foreign governments, universities, and private donors. They vary by individual country.

There are many opportunities, but they vary from country to country. U

Fulbright Grants for U.S. Faculty and Professionals: This offers a variety of opportunities for lecturing and research abroad through country, regional, and special programs. Awards are distributed by country and region; vary in activity and length of stay. They will fall into one of these categories:

Research: Awards principally for research activity.

Lecturing: Awards principally for lecturing, either as stipulated in the assignment or proposed independently.

Lecturing/Research: Awards for combined lecturing and research activity, with the expectation that both activities will take place during the grant.

Distinguished Lecturing: a small number of awards offered in selected countries to scholars who are outstanding in the disciplines or professions. Recognized national standing is normally required.

Junior Lecturing and Junior Research Grants: Awards designed primarily for recent Ph.D.s and others early in their careers or, in certain specified circumstances.

Seminars: Short term seminar or group programs

Serial Grants: Awards that allow the grant to be divided into shorter- in country stays over a predetermined period of time.

Travel Only Grants: Awards that provide only roundtrip transportation to the country where the scholar will lecture or conduct research.

Partial Grants: awards that have a stipend or other fixed amount of support that is usually lower than the standard award benefits for the country.

Full Maintenance Grants: Awards that provide full benefits. Used in those instances where partial-maintenance grants are offered as a means of distinguishing level of support available. For more information and a specific description of the grants available go to: www.cies.org **F**
